## Building Better Opportunities - Read all about it!

Building Better Opportunities is a programme which will address social inclusion in the Tees Valley area by delivering support to disadvantaged working aged people to move them towards the labour market. It uses European Social Funds that have been matched by the Big Lottery.



Building Better Opportunities will be a single service across the Tees Valley.



It will be managed by one Lead Body with a range of organisations working together as a partnership.

You can now read all about it - The project outline for the Tees Valley Building Better Opportunities programme titled 'Holistic Support' was published by Big Lottery on June 5th. Tees Valley Holistic Support has £8,880,100 of funds, will start sometime between March 2016 to August 2016 and will run up till December 2019, with a posible extension for another three years. It has the following three themes:

- 1. Removing Health and Wellbeing Barriers to Employment for those with multiple complex needs. This will address multiple barriers to entering work, offering support to participants who may be experiencing poor physical and mental health, childcare or caring responsibilities, poor unstable housing situations, drug and alcohol addictions, lack of personal transport and lack of basic social/employability skills.
- 2. Steps towards employment. This will provide ways that people can become work-ready. Supporting Individuals to gain work-related experience through access to volunteering and other work experience opportunities.
- 3. Financial/Digital Inclusion. This will provide support for individuals to develop their financial and digital skills to improve their financial stability.

It will support at least 2153 people by involving them in activities to improve their work readiness, including at least:

1435 men;

718 women;

1076 people who are unemployed;

1077 people who are economically inactive;

322 people who are 50 or older;

431 people with disabilities;

108 people from ethnic minorities

People can be counted more than once in each category.

Organisations hoping to become the Lead Body for the Tees Valley have until the 3rd of August to get the first stage of their application to the Lottery. This means they will be forming partnerships with local groups across the Tees Valley.
